
## 20th Annual Sheep is Life Celebration

DBI features Navajo-Churro products made by Diné shepherds and fiber artists from sheep sustainably raised in the Navajo Nation.

Diné be' liná's mission is to restore the balance between Diné culture, life, and land. While serving all sheep producers, DBI is dedicated to conserving the traditional Navajo-Churro sheep breed as well as to educating the community and the public about the importance of Diné Sheep Culture and spirituality.

DBI's programs, marketing, and technical assistance help Diné shepherds and weavers regain their economic self-sufficiency by:

1) marketing value-added Diné sheep and wool products; 2) increasing income earned by Diné shepherds and weavers from their work; and 3) revitalizing our communities through culturally-relevant local enterprise.

Diné land management and wool processing techniques are predicated on the special qualities of the Navajo-Churro sheep, a breed developed by Diné shepherds and weavers in collaboration with the Southwest environment. DBI was founded in 1991 to work with the Navajo Sheep Project for restoring the Navajo-Churro sheep to the Navajo Nation. In 2002, Navajo-Churro sheep were elected to the Slow Food Ark of Taste.

DBI is a nonprofit organization incorporated in the Navajo Nation and is a federally tax-exempt 501c3 corporation. It is managed by a volunteer Board of Directors and assisted by many individuals who generously contribute time and resources. We collaborate with the American Livestock Breeds Conservancy, Navajo-Churro Sheep Association, Diné College Land Grant Program, and others to promote the breed and ensure its continuation.







## **Spin Off Groups**

Dine Be' iiná is dedicated in promoting economic self-sufficiency with sheep wool and sheep culture. Seasonally, across the Navajo Nation small communities gather to share fiber projects and create value added wool pieces. Spin offs are informal groups of sheep herders and wool/fiber enthusiasts that meet monthly to exchange knowledge about sheepherding, hands on learning of new fiber art techniques and anything that connects to the Navajo pastoral lifeway. Communities learn various topics of involving wool, hand carding, wool spinning, felting, wool dyeing, to Navajo weaving and many more.

## Navajo Churro Lamb Presidium (NCLP)

The NCLP was officially founded in 2006 under the Presidia, a branch of the Slow Foods International/Slow Meat. The group is composed of a collective of Navajo shepherds/ ranchers. The presidium focuses on the Navajo-Churro sheep breed and bridging the Navajo shepherds/ranchers to restaurant/catering businesses and other food markets. The Presidium established its shepherds to follow protocols with the Navajo-Churro Sheep Association and the USDA to ensure good, clean, fair quality meats to market. It continues to advocate for the Navajo-Churro sheep breed, quality meat and sustainable and fair practices. The NCLP continues to actively seek new members. For more information call 928-656-3498.
